D1 LONDON: 2,000 YEARS OF A CITY AND ITS PEOPLE Monday 22nd July Tutor: Andrew Davies is a lecturer for the Arts Society and the National Trust. He is the author of 9 books (including 'The East End Nobody Knows') a journalist and historian, and for 30 years has run his own London walks company called 'All about London'.

A city which never fails to beguile, intrigue (and sometimes infuriate), we will trace its development from the Romans to today. Subjects to be covered include the River Thames, London's railway and tube stations, the city walls, the Blitz, suburbia, and individuals such as Samuel Pepys, JMW Turner and Sir John Betjeman.

#### D2 WILKIE COLLINS AND HIS CIRCLE

Tutor: Lucinda Hawksley is an author, broadcaster and lecturer, and a patron of the Charles Dickens Museum in London and the De Morgan Foundation. She has written more than 20 books; her latest title is Dickens and Travel.

2024 marks the bicentenary of the birth of the author Wilkie Collins (1824-1899) – a larger-than-life Victorian whose novels and plays were as melodramatic as his personal life. Today, he is best known for just two of his novels, "The Moonstone" and "The Woman in White", but he wrote 30 novels, as well as plays and short stories. In this one-day workshop, biographer and historian Lucinda Hawksley will look at the life and works of Wilkie Collins, as well as the lives of some of his friends and family members.

#### D3 BEGINNERS BRUSH CALLIGRAPHY

#### Monday 22nd July

Tutor: Jen Roffe is a lettering artist with 10 years of experience creating, exhibiting and selling her own collection of calligraphy prints and working on signage for events and businesses. She teaches regular Brush Calligraphy workshops in Hertfordshire as well as offering corporate team building workshops and special calligraphy events at Christmas.

Learn how to create beautiful lettering using brush-pens in this modern, relaxed and informal style of calligraphy. In this workshop we will learn all the beginner rules (and then how to break them) to begin creating our own fun, unique style. Demonstrations throughout the day will cover the essentials of modern calligraphy style - how to position yourself and your paper and how to use the brush tips for maximum contrast. Together we will learn beginner brush strokes and mark making, and practise cursive script alphabets. Using the techniques we have learnt we will practise with template designs and create our own handlettered pieces that we can frame or send as cards. Before long you'll be creating for every gifting event in the calendar, plus ensuring yourself some creative 'me-time' for some mindful moments of creativity at home.

Student Requirements: A full starter kit will be available for each student on the day for £10 which includes the black and gold metallic brush-pens, templates, practise sheets, blank cards, envelopes and gift tags.

#### D5 DYNAMIC PENCIL DRAWING

#### Monday 22nd July

Tutor: David Lewry, BA (Hons), SWSBA, UKCPS, runs a number of very successful classes and workshops in watercolour and drawing. He tutors on cruise ships where he has inspired many people to take up an exciting new hobby. As an accomplished Botanical Artist, he was awarded a silver medal by the Royal Horticultural Society in 2009 and has contributed illustrations to



several award-winning books and magazines.

The humble pencil is capable of producing some dynamic effects and images by utilising the full tonal range from black to white.

This course will teach you how to use this tonal range to dramatically improve your

sketching and drawing. You will be guided from the early stages of planning and composition right through to final rendering using examples from the tutor's own portfolio and from some of the great artists of the past. You will learn how to produce a tonal strip and do a number of drawings to practise and develop your skills.

Using overhead cameras and a projector you will be able to follow the techniques close-up in real-time.

WARNING - this course will seriously improve your drawing skills!

Student requirements: 3 or 4 sheets of A4 Cartridge paper, graphite pencils (grades 2H, HB, 2B, 6B, 9B or 8B if 9B unavailable), ruler, eraser & pencil sharpener.

#### D6 ZENTANGLE

#### Monday 22nd July

Tutor: Jane Marbaix is a Certified Zentangle Teacher having trained in Massachusetts USA in 2011. She has taught Adult Education classes and has been teaching at The Cardinal Clinic in Windsor for the last 10 years. She is also the author of 5 Zentangle books.

The Zentangle Method is an easy-to-learn, relaxing, and fun way to create beautiful images by drawing structured patterns. We call these patterns "tangles". You create tangles with combinations of dots, lines, simple curves, S-curves and orbs. These simple shapes are the "Elemental Strokes" in all Zentangle art.

This will be a beginner's course with the basics taught in the morning and a project in the afternoon.



Student requirements: Black fineliner (01-04), 2B pencil. Items will be available to buy on the day for  $\pounds 2$ .

#### D7 FARMS, FORKS AND FLUMMERY Tuesday 23rd July THE HISTORY OF GROWING, COOKING AND DINING IN ENGLAND 1500-1950. Tutor: Adam Smith is a former museum curator who has been lecturing on English Country Houses and their Estates for over 20 years. He holds degrees from the Universities of Durham and Leeds in History and Country House

This course gives an overview of how food was produced and consumed in England from Tudor times to the 20th Century.

We will look at food from field to fork seeing how the ingredients available changed and the ways in which they were cooked and eaten evolved.

- Farms and Ingredients How agriculture has supplied a changing population.
- Sugar and Spice How much has imported and preserved food contributed to our diets?
- Recipes and Equipment Examining historic cooking equipment and recipes.
- Fires and Stoves Changing equipment, changing food.

## D8 MASTERPIECES IN THE NATIONAL GALLERY Tuesday 23rd July Tutor: Joan Greening BA (Hons), MA. Joan has taught art to adults for over thirty years. She enjoys all styles of art but specialises in the Old Masters. She has visited all the major art galleries in the world but particularly loves the National Gallery.



Studies.

This course will look briefly at the history of the National Gallery and some of the great paintings it contains. It will cover many of the world-famous artists such as Botticelli, Raphael, Rembrandt and Goya. British artists Turner, Reynolds and Gainsborough will be included as well. It will also study some of the less wellknown artists who are equally talented.

Each painting will be set in its historic context and each artist will be discussed in full. Symbolism will be explored, and the artwork will be divided into the five genres of art. Styles will be examined and Early Renaissance, High Renaissance, Mannerism, Baroque and Rococo will be covered.

This course is suitable for all students whether they are starting on their art journey or a long way through it!



#### BRUSH CALLIGRAPHY WITH COLOUR -**D9** METALLIC INKS

#### Tutor: Jen Roffe is a lettering artist with 10 years of experience creating, exhibiting and selling her own collection of calligraphy prints and working on signage for events and businesses. She teaches regular Brush Calligraphy workshops in Hertfordshire as well as offering corporate team building workshops and special

Learn how to create a beautifully illustrated and handlettered piece using metallic brush-pens.

In this workshop we will learn the relaxed and informal style of modern calligraphy - the key calligraphy strokes and a cursive script alphabet. We will then go on to learn how to transfer calligraphy to dark coloured surfaces and add a colour layer to create some really eye-catching effects.

Using the techniques we have learnt we will practise with template designs and create our own hand-lettered piece on card, ensuring the opportunity of some creative 'me-time' and some mindful moments of creativity during the day.

#### D10 THE STORY OF THE BIBLE

Tutor: Paul Luckraft has a 1st class degree in Theology from the Open Theological College. He has spent many years teaching in local churches and elsewhere, and has developed his own courses. He is a published author and has his own website, www.orchardseeds.com.

To many people the Bible is a special book yet few are aware how it came into existence.

In particular, how did the individual books come to be written and how were they brought together into a single volume? We may also wonder how we can best read the Bible today to get the most out of an old and at times obscure text. What are its main themes and threads? What is the role of inspiration and faith?

Whether you read the Bible regularly or not, there will be plenty for us to explore together.

#### D11 COLOURED PENCILS: BENGAL TIGER

#### Tuesday 23rd July

Tutor: David Lewry, BA (Hons), SWSBA, UKCPS, runs a number of very successful classes and workshops in watercolour and drawing. He tutors on cruise ships where he has inspired many people to take up an exciting new hobby. As an accomplished Botanical Artist, he was awarded a silver medal by the Royal Horticultural Society in 2009 and has contributed illustrations to several award-winning books and magazines.

You will produce a stunning portrait of a Bengal tiger using coloured pencils.

You will be taught the skills required to draw convincing fur, eyes, ears and whiskers. Using overhead cameras and a projector you will be able to follow the techniques close-up in real-time. Before the lesson you will be provided with a full list of materials including a colour matching chart and a black and white template to copy or trace. The image will be drawn on coloured paper to further enhance the effect and full instructions will be provided throughout. This project is suitable for all skill levels.



Student requirements: Coloured pencils (colour matching chart provided), a template pre-drawn on suitable paper (details provided beforehand), pencil sharpener and eraser.

#### D12 BEGINNERS' MAH-JONG: BRITISH STANDARD AS PLAYED AT LOCAL U3A

#### Tuesday 23rd July

Tutor: Sam Patel is a retired Mathematics teacher and currently manages the U3A Mah-jong Group.

Mah-jong is a Chinese game that is played with tiles, testing players' powers of observation, reasoning and judgement. Similar to the Western card game Rummy, it is typically played by four players.

This course will provide you with the opportunity to learn the many layers of this game of strategy from the ground up while receiving guidance on the tactics and scoring system.

The objective of the session is to equip those who participate with the confidence to join a Mah-jong group and play with those slightly more experienced.

All the necessary equipment will be provided on the day.

Please note, whilst we follow the British Rules, we have introduced a few tweaks to make it accessible for all abilities and to increase our enjoyment of the game.

D13 CURRENT ISSUES IN SCIENCE AND RELIGION Wednesday 24th July Tutor: Dr Denis Alexander is the Founding Director [Emeritus] of The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion and Emeritus Fellow of St. Edmund's College, Cambridge, Previously he was chair of the Molecular Immunology Programme at The Babraham Institute, Cambridge.

The Course will provide a broad introductory overview to the field of science and religion and then focus on three current issues in the field; first, the question as to whether one can derive any coherent philosophy from the biological theory of evolution; second, the role of genetics in human behaviours and whether this role supports genetic determinism; and third, the ethical questions that arise from the current rapid advances in science.

In each case the topics will be related to theological insights, drawing in particular from the speaker's own Christian tradition.

#### D14 STORIES FROM PROVENCE: Part 1 - THE LAND OF MILK AND HONEY.

Tutor: Maggie Knight BA Fine Art, MA History of Art, PhD History of Art. Founded the Adult Education section at the V&A Museum. She ran her own classes in art and cultural history in London, and is now teaching for The Arts Society and leading tours to Europe and America.

'The Land of Milk and Honey' is the story of one of the most fascinating states in medieval Europe. In the five centuries before they became part of the French kingdom the Provencal courts and cosmopolitan cities were producing the finest visual art. music and poetry in the west, a synthesis of the cultural legacies left by the incomers from Rome to Moorish Spain which had shaped the Mediterranean lands of Gaul

#### LINOCUT PRINTING FOR BEGINNERS D15

Tutor: Kim Raymont (MA) is a printmaker, specialising in reduction linocut. She graduated from Cambridge School of Art with a Masters in Illustration and Book Arts, and has taught creative printmaking workshops alongside building a print collection and undertaking commissions.

In this inspiring and relaxed workshop. Kim will show you how to use rollers and stencils to make simple and striking abstract monoprints; you'll then look at prints by artists such as Picasso and Gauguin, and be shown how to use linocut tools to create, carve and print a design of your own, producing a range of lino prints.

After lunch you'll have the opportunity to develop your linocut into a reduction print by carving into it further and adding additional layers of colour; alternatively, you can incorporate bright tissue into your linocut to explore collagraph, or carve and print a new design.

You'll be encouraged to explore the possibilities of print throughout the day and finish with a range of linocuts, and new skills and understanding.

#### D17 iPAD: EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW

Tutor: Susan Mills, Cert Ed, MA, experienced teacher.

This course gives you the confidence and knowledge to explore and join the digital world - without asking a teenager!

Got yourself in a pickle over a problem with your iPad, or just bought a new device, but you don't really know what it can do? I will show you how to control your iPad and iPhone.

For example, how to: Reduce battery use, clear history, remove cookies. Basics such as emailing, privacy settings, online purchase, bill payment, tailoring personal preferences. Watch TV, listen to music, podcasts, engage with family and friends using FaceTime. Use Message and FaceTime to call and message and see friends and family for free.

There is a whole world out there just waiting for you to explore and use. I have tips, tricks and laughter to share with you.

Student Requirements: Please bring your device and a charging lead.

#### D18 MINIATURE QUILTS

#### Wednesday 24th July

Tutor: Julia Gahagan has been making miniature quilts for 20 years and sells her kits and patterns through her Etsy shop. She travels the UK teaching her quick and easy technique at quilt shows and events.

With just fabric, glue and scissors you will make a mini quilt (approx. 5"x7") using shadow appliqué, where a transparent 'shadow' fabric is placed over the work to secure all the small pieces in place. Hand quilting and embroidery will secure the design in place and you will receive full instructions to complete the design at home (if required).

There will be a choice of designs and everyone will make one small sample quilt alongside their final design. The technique is quick, easy and fun and suits complete beginners as well as more experienced sewers.

There will also be various kits to purchase on the day if you wish.







Student requirements: a basic sewing kit (needles, small pins, thimble if you use one) along with 2 pairs of scissors (4" and 2" blades, <u>not</u> embroidery ones) and a fabric glue pen (there will be some to share on the day). The materials for this class will cost  $\pounds$ 10, payable to the tutor.

#### D19 GENIUS OF JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH

Thursday 25th July

Tutor: Peter Medhurst appears in the UK and abroad as musician and scholar, giving recitals and delivering illustrated lectures on music and the arts. He studied singing and early keyboard instruments at the Royal College of Music and at the Mozarteum in Salzburg.

Claude Debussy once said of Bach that he was 'A benevolent God, to whom musicians should offer a prayer before setting to work so that they may be preserved from mediocrity'.

Since there is nothing mediocre about the works of Bach, he is certainly an ideal candidate for inspiring fellow composers. However, so highly developed are Bach's musical achievements that it is easy to forget that he, too, had to learn his craft and develop a personal style which he did in part by studying and assimilating the works of others.

This course examines a range of key works by Bach, including Cantata No 78, the Organ Preludes, The Italian Concerto, The Mass in B minor and The Goldberg Variations.

## D20 WILDE ABOUT OSCAR: Thursday 25th July THE EXTRAORDINARY LIFE AND TIMES OF OSCAR WILDE.

Tutor: Simon Whitehouse is a (recovering) actor, lecturer, presenter, Alexander Technique & voice teacher, and award-winning London Blue Badge Guide. He regularly guides for Arts Society groups and has worked as an in-house guide lecturer in house at Shakespeare's Globe, the Royal Opera House, the BBC & the National Gallery, guiding a wide variety of public & private tours. He is on the faculty of Ithaca College and also lectures for the Blue Badge Guide training courses. Simon's specialisms & passions are theatre, literature, fashion & art history, but whatever the subject, Simon will weave a wonderful story from it!

To begin our exploration of Oscar's life, we look at his early years, including his artistic circle and rising celebrity.



We then take a look at the period when Oscar enjoyed his greatest success, including the publication of his only novel, "The Picture of Dorian Gray", and his incredible theatrical triumphs (with a special focus on his final and most brilliant play, "The Importance of Being Earnest").

Finally, we discover how disaster struck at the peak of this success, leading to the criminal trial of the century, prison and exile. We conclude the day with an appreciation of Oscar's enduring legacy and how he continues to inspire and entertain us today.

#### D21 PLAYFUL BEGINNERS WATERCOLOUR

Thursday 25th July

Tutor: Kate Buchanan is a mixed media artist living and working in Hertfordshire running workshops and art classes for all ages including Watercolour, Lino, Collage and Printing.

"I believe we are all creative, we just need a little time and space to play. "

Learn how to play in the world of watercolours. Using highly pigmented paints and a variety of different watercolour papers we will create small watercolour paintings. I will teach you a few tricks and tips to achieve mantlepiece worthy artwork!

Be reassured I assume no previous knowledge if you're new to this and if you do have a little more confidence, I have a selection of different papers to try. We will be painting a riverbank, a beach view, some pots and plants and a garland of flowers.

Watercolour paper, postcards, envelopes, cards and mount board will all be included in your introductory pack. All of which you can take home with you should you want to continue your watercolour journey.



I will lend you brushes, palette and paint for the day.

Student requirements: £15 for the materials for this class, payable to the tutor.

### D23 MODERN ARCHITECTURE: IN TUNE WITH THE PAST?

#### Thursday 25th July

Tutor: Keith Hasted has a Masters in History of Architecture and is the author of a recent book on Modernist Architecture in Britain. He lectures at Oxford University Continuing Education and for the WEA.

In his 1994 speech at Hampton Court to the Royal Institute of British Architects, Prince Charles famously described the winning modernist design for an extension to the National Gallery as a carbuncle – setting off a public debate about the way in which new architecture should relate to historic buildings and their surroundings.

We will consider how modern architects have worked with historic buildings in projects such as Norman Foster's Reichstag in Berlin, Hertzog and de Meuron's Tate Modern in London, the modernising of the BBC's Broadcasting House and Basil Spence's creation of Coventry Cathedral after WW2.

#### D24 NEEDLE FELTING

#### Thursday 25th July

Tutor: Rebecca Bennett is a local mixed media artist with a passion for inspiring students with a desire to be creative. Following a degree in Fine Art Sculpture, Rebecca worked as an Art and Design teacher for the last 15 years in both the UK and USA. Her sculptural works have been displayed in both the Royal West of England Academy in Bristol & The Royal Society of British Sculptors in London. Art and educating are her main passions resulting in her Art and Craft business and workshops.

In this fun, one-day workshop you will learn how to create a seascape or landscape using the unique art form of dry needle felting. You will learn about compositions and how to layer and blend the felt to create a tranquil scene and there will be demonstrations and hands-on assistance. You might choose to focus on just one final piece, or alternatively create a series to show, for example, a sunset or sunrise or perhaps something you have captured on holiday or in a special place. The image is just the starting point, as your piece will naturally develop and change slightly as you work with the felt, so don't worry if you don't have a specific image to work from.

You can develop your piece by adding texture and interest with colourful strips of fabric and lace, and you can add details through hand or machine embroidery. A shadow box frame of  $18 \times 18$  cm is included in the workshop and additional frames can be bought on the day for £5.

*Student requirements: Buttons, embroidery thread (optional), reference seascape image (optional).* 

Please be aware that the technique is fairly repetitive so may not be suitable for people with back/neck pain.

She holds a Jewellers' Academy 'Diploma in Silver Jewellery' and an Art Clay World UK 'Diploma Level 1'.

Silver clay is an amazing, versatile medium, made from fine particles of recycled silver, organic binder and water. It can be textured, cut, then fired to produce solid silver jewellery.



This course will teach you how to create a simple fine silver (999)



pendant and pair of earrings using different textures (including real leaves).

You will design, make, fire, and polish your pieces by the end of the course and can wear your jewellery home.

Prints have always been the affordable alternative to paintings. They often form parts of contemporary books and reveal London's history well.

Using prints the capital's fine buildings, facilities and topography are revealed in all their glory. Come and discover London's past.

#### D31 SYMBOLIST ART

Tutor: Dalila Castelijn has taught for Reading and Oxford Universities' Continuing Education Departments and for the WEA. As an Open University associate lecturer, she has led tours abroad. BA Hons (Birkbeck College, University of London) Laurea (University of Trieste, Italy).

Born in the 1880s out of a desire to reject the objective representation of the world, the Symbolist movement stood for art which reflected emotions and ideas through colour line and composition.

Typical Symbolist themes of love, fear, death and desire will be explored in the works of Gustave Moreau and Puvis de Chavannes, Edvard Munch and Jan Toorop, Paul Gauguin and Gustav Klimt.

#### D32 SCANDI ART AND ITS DESIGN: 1880-1960

Tutor: Author and broadcaster, Dr Anne Anderson, was Senior Lecturer in History of Art for fourteen years at Southampton Solent University. She has curated four national art exhibitions. Anne's career as an international speaker has taken her from Spain to Australia.

Scandinavian artists emerged as leaders of progressive art and design at the turn of the 20th century. Following the French avantgarde, Danish, Swedish, Finnish and Norwegian painters embraced Realism, Naturalism and Impressionism. After studying in Paris, they invariably returned home, establishing rural colonies to paint directly from nature outdoors. During the 1890s,



Naturalists vied with Symbolists who sought to capture the spirit of a place rather than merely create an accurate rendering. No one captured the angst of the era more effectively than Edvard Munch. As well as covering the Fine Arts, the impact on Scandinavian designers of the Arts and Crafts, Art Nouveau, Art Deco and Modernism will all be traced, bringing us up to the 1950s when it can be said Scandinavian design came of age.

#### D33 PEN AND WATERCOLOUR WASH

#### Monday 29th July

Tutor: Sharon Hurst is a Tutor, Demonstrator and TV Artist and is known for the vibrant colours and bold designs in all her work, from fantasy watercolour and silk scarves through to beaded jewellery. Entirely self-taught, she believes in breaking rules because, as she says, "No-one ever taught me any, so I just go my own way and experiment"! Sharon's work is available in galleries both here and abroad.

Come and try this interesting technique. We will be drawing a cottage, looking at proportion and detail, learning how to simplify the details. This will then be drawn in with a waterproof pen before we lay in a gentle wash of colours.

This is a delightful technique to get you started should you ever want to sit outside and sketch, on holiday for instance.

Tutor will have black pens (£3), paper and some brushes at various prices to purchase on the day if you wish.

Student requirements: Watercolour paints, brushes, cloth/paper towel for dabbing & mopping, paper (if you have it), pencil, rubber, waterproof black sketching pen.

#### D35 QUILTING: STACK AND SLASH

#### Monday 29th July

Tutor: Helen Nice has 40 years of teaching, advising in sewing, dressmaking, patchwork and quilting. For the last 18 years she has also been running private patchwork and quilting classes.

The Stack and Slash method requires you to stack identical sized pieces of material on top of one another and slash through the whole stack so each cut is the same through each layer and then rearrange them before sewing back together to get stunning and varied results.

You can make 6 blocks at a time for example depending on how many you stack! Very quick to do and one block can easily be made into a simple item on the day eg. table mat, coaster, etc. Or be taken home to turn into a larger project.

This class would be easier with the use of a sewing machine but is possible with hand sewing.

If you forget something on the day or haven't been able to find the right thing, Helen will have these items to purchase as well as other sewing items if needed. There will also be a cutting board and rotary cutter to share on the day if required.

Student requirements: 6 fat quarters of selected material, sewing kit & threads, cutting board, rotary cutter & ruler and a sewing machine if you wish to bring.

#### D36 VOLCANOES: THE WHAT, WHERE AND WHY Monday 29th July

Tutor: Dr Eyers is a geologist and has lectured for several UK universities and local groups. Her career took her to many parts of the world with projects in the Caribbean, Brazil and Turkey. Most of her professional work was as a freelance consultant. Now semi-retired she has written numerous books.

What is a volcano and why do you only find them in certain parts of the world? We will look at many case studies of well-known volcanoes. Vesuvius and Etna will feature, as will the Canaries and others. Why are there ancient volcanoes in Britain and when did they become extinct?

These questions will be answered during this course as well as learning how to identify different volcanic rocks and minerals, and discovering how to interpret volcanoes from their shape. It is very hands-on and uses real rocks and minerals, which we will learn how to identify.

We will explore many locations around the world. Discover what information rocks and specific volcano shapes 'lock in'. We will use this information to be able to tell us about very ancient volcanoes and also about those that are active today. Volcanic activity is happening all the time – what is erupting on the day or week of the class? We can then explain the activity with knowledge from the tutor's rocks and case studies.

What is the most dangerous volcano in the world? How do geologists know? Anyone with an interest in the topic will benefit.



#### D37 STORY OF ENGLISH CATHEDRALS AND PARISH CHURCHES

Tuesday 30th July

Tutor: Andrew Davies is a lecturer for the Arts Society and the National Trust. He is the author of 9 books (including 'The East End Nobody Knows') a journalist and historian, and for 30 years has run his own London walks company called 'All about London'.

Whether it be the large (Liverpool Anglican Cathedral, Winchester Cathedral, St Paul's Cathedral or the Wool churches of East Anglia), or the small (lonely Saxon churches, intimate overlooked City churches in York and Norwich) these buildings tell our history in stone, glass, wood and people.

Each one has its own unique voice - and we will listen to some of their stories.

D38 BRIDGE: IMPROVING YOUR DEFENSIVE SIGNALLING Tuesday 30th July Tutors: Tim Chanter has been a full-time bridge teacher for 10 years, working

#### D41 **QUILTING: SASHIKO**

Tutor: Helen Nice has 40 years of teaching, and advising in sewing, dressmaking, patchwork and guilting. For the last 18 years she has also been running private patchwork and guilting classes.

Sashiko literally means "little stabs" - it is a form of decorative reinforcement stitching (or functional embroidery) from Japan. Traditional Sashiko was used to reinforce points of wear, or to repair worn places or tears with patches. It is

usually in the form of small running stitches in white thread on a dark blue fabric. You can use this embroidery to make into a rice bag, shopping bag, small wall hanging, placemats, table runners, etc.

> Embroidery will be done by hand and your machine can be used to make embroideries into other projects as you wish. Items also available on the day to purchase.

Student requirements: hand sewing kit, a fat guarter of plain fabric (traditionally dark blue). Sashiko threads, white marking pen (if using dark fabric) and a Quilters white pencil.

#### D42 EUROPEAN COURT PAINTERS

#### Tuesday 30th July

Tutor: Kate Phillips worked as an NHS Theatre Sister, retired and went to the Courtauld to do a Post-Graduate Diploma in History of Art. She then worked as a tutor teaching Art History and has been with the WEA for 19 years, working at branches and on-line.

This day class will introduce painters who were employed by kings, emperors, princes and dukes to glorify themselves and their courts. These artists were salaried and a regular income demonstrated how much they were valued by their masters. I shall begin in the Early Renaissance with Jan van Eyck in Flanders, then move to Italy. Here I shall discuss Gentile Bellini's mission to the court of Sultan Mehmet 11 and the courts of Urbino and Mantua where Piero della Francesca and Mantegna flourished.

Moving on in time, I shall cover the court painters of the Tudors - Holbein and Hilliard and the Pope's painters - Raphael and Rubens. I shall describe the legacy of Titian's works for the Holy Roman Emperor and I shall finish with a discussion of one of the most famous images of courtly life - Velasquez' Las Meninas.

#### D43 ISTANBUL: A CULTURAL TOUR

#### Wednesday 31st July

Tutor: Dalila Castelijn has taught for Reading and Oxford Universities' Continuing Education Departments, and for the WEA. As an Open University associate lecturer, Dalila has lead tours abroad. BA Hons (Birkbeck College, University of London), Laurea (University of Trieste, Italy).

The course explores the architectural and artistic treasures of Istanbul, a city shaped by being the meeting point of Europe and Asia for centuries.

We shall examine the remains of the ancient city, founded by the Emperor Constantine, before focussing on Byzantine masterpieces such as Hagia Sophia and the Church of St Saviour in Chora with their splendid mosaic decorations.

The Topkapi Palace, for nearly four centuries main residence of the Sultans, the imperial architecture of Sinan and the Blue Mosque are among the Ottoman buildings to be explored.



#### D44 STORIES FROM PROVENCE Wednesday 31st July Part 2- TROUBADOURS, HERETICS AND THE COURTS OF LOVE.

Tutor: Maggie Knight BA Fine Art, MA History of Art, PhD History of Art, founded the Adult Education section at the V&A Museum. She ran her own classes in art and cultural history in London, and is now teaching for The Arts Society and leading tours to Europe and America.

By the 12th century the music and poetry of the aristocratic troubadours of Provence and their ideal of 'Courtly love' were spreading across Europe and inspiring art and literature.

At the same time the mercantile towns of the south were attracting followers of a new faith.

Known as the Albigensians or the Cathars they were inadvertently responsible for erosion of Provencal independence.

#### D45 ACRYLIC PAINTING STEP-BY-STEP: FLORAL ABUNDANCE

#### Wednesday 31st July

Tutor: Heather McDowell. Whether people are returning after many years away from painting or starting as complete beginners, Heather's classes and workshops offer something for everyone. #### D48 ICE AGE TO IRON AGE

#### Wednesday 31st July

Tutor: Dr Eyers is a geologist and has lectured for several UK universities and local groups. Her career took her to many parts of the world with projects in the Caribbean, Brazil and Turkey. Most of her professional work was as a freelance consultant. Now semi-retired she has written numerous books.

Studying the Ice Age is much like being a crime detective. Clues are small and far between, but little clues build up into hard evidence for a tremendously exciting story. That story is of the dramatic changes that the Earth has undergone in terms of climate fluctuations.

During the day we look at the main ice ages of Earth's long history, including Snowball Earth. We then discover what controlled the glacier advances and retreats of the last ice age and how our ancestors not only survived, but the event was crucial to our evolution. What was life like in the Stone Age?

The tutor will use presentations, maps and lots of artefacts to make an interesting day.

Student requirements: pencil, rubber, sharpener, and a hand-lens/magnifier is handy (tutor will have some spares).

#### D49 THE HISTORY OF TREE IN ART, FROM GIOTTO TO KLIMT

#### Thursday 1st August

Tutor: Clare Ford-Wille has been lecturing for many years, for Birkbeck College, University of London, the V. and A., Morley College, the City Literary Institute, as well as the National Gallery, NADFAS/The Fine Arts Society, the National Trust and the Art Fund.

Throughout the history of European art, the tree has been of great importance as a punctuation mark within a composition, to create perspective, to draw attention to the figures, to offer a framework or to give meaning to the subject of the painting or sculpture.

Dead or broken trees can symbolise death, a living tree in contrast can indicate everlasting life or resurrection, and in the Garden of Eden the Tree of Knowledge is crucial to the Fall of Adam and Eve. Trees are such an enhancement of a painting or sculpture.

The study day will explore the myriad of ways in which artists and sculptors, such as Giotto, Piero della Francesca, Jan van Eyck, Bellini, Bernini, Caspar David Friedrich or Constable, among so many others, use trees in their work.



### D50 CLASSICAL CHAT: AN INTRODUCTION TO Thursday 1st August CLASSICAL MUSIC AND POPULAR CLASSICAL THEMES

Tutors:

<u>Lisa Friend</u> RCM BMus(hons) British flautist, is a soloist, chamber musician, recording artist and teacher.

<u>Anna Stokes</u> RCM BMus(hons) British flautist, is a freelance orchestral/chamber player, teacher and examiner.

Lisa and Anna have a wealth of experience in the world of classical music.

This course is an introduction to the world of classical music. Through this journey, they will explore:

- the most popular works of some of the greatest classical composers/performers past and present, and

- instruments of the orchestra.

No prior knowledge of classical music is required.

From classical music novices to experienced classical music lovers, all are welcome. Classes take place in a relaxed and informal setting.

#### D51 WILLOW WEAVING

Thursday 1st August

Tutor: Mary Sibley is a retired art teacher and volunteered to work on the Coronation Arches.

You will be weaving 3 small projects during the day which you will take home with you: a Star, a Heart and a Reindeer.

There will be tips and ideas given throughout the day. You will go home with the 3 finished projects and a smile on your face!

NB Pleased be advised, that if you have arthritic hands, you will find willow weaving very difficult.

Student requirements: Secateurs and £5 for willow payable to tutor.

#### D53 FLORA AND FAUNA:

#### SYMBOLISMS, ATTRIBUTIONS AND LEGENDS

Tutor: Richard Box studied painting at Hastings School of Art and then at Goldsmiths School of Art, where he discovered Embroidery as a textile form of art. Since then, he has been developing and exhibiting his work in both of these complementary disciplines. As an Art Historian, he has lectured for The Arts Society and others, and he also runs practical workshops for interested groups. In 2024 he has been offered a Gallery at the Knitting & Stitching Show at Alexandra Palace.

All over the world, throughout history, it would appear that flora and fauna carry meanings and symbolise certain qualities and feelings.

We will illustrate by paintings, carvings and other artistic images from various cultures from the past three thousand years and how the meaning of particular flowers can vary in different parts of the world. Brutes, birds and all kinds of beasties have, throughout history, been endowed with symbolic meanings, attributed to historical characters and have appeared in many myths and legends.

We will show examples of all this with artistic representations from various cultures since history began.

#### D54 FIRST STEPS INTO CROCHET

#### Thursday 1st August

Tutor: Sarah Barclay. Crochet is good for the mind, body and soul! Being able to share my knowledge and therefore the benefits of this craft, is my way of giving back and making my corner of the world a better more colourful place.

A step-by-step lesson guiding you into your very first venture of learning to crochet. We will start with the very basics of creating a slip knot and a chain. We will work our way through single, double and treble crochet stitches cumulating in you having started making your own Granny Square by the end of the day. We will also discuss yarn types and thicknesses, hook types and styles and even dabble in colour palettes.

Student requirements: Crochet hook (if you have) and yarn (if you already have chunky yarn). However, yarn, hook, stitch marker kits will be available on the day to purchase for £5.

#### D55 EVENTS IN EUROPEAN HISTORY

#### Friday 2nd August

Tutor: Bernard Foot was educated as a scientist, and his working life was spent in IT. He hated history at school – but later became interested in history, including of southern Austria, his mother's homeland, and the surrounding areas of former Yugoslavia.

In this session we will look at four aspects of European history.

First, we shall discuss the history of Ukraine – a topical subject for obvious reasons. This will cover the period from the earliest knowledge of the region about 5,000 years ago up to Russia's invasion in 2022.

Then we will cover two less momentous but nevertheless fascinating events from the Second World War. These both sound similar at the headline level as they are both about escapes of British and Commonwealth Prisoners of War from the same PoW camp and involving the Yugoslavian Partisans - but in reality, the two stories are quite different.

Finally, we will look at the lives and careers of three great generals from the early 19th century – Blücher, Napoleon, and Wellington – leading up to the denouement at the Battle of Waterloo.

**D56** WHITE GOLD- MEISSEN AND SEVRES PORCELAINS Friday 2nd August Tutor: Scott Anderson. Having retired from his position as a Senior Lecturer in Art and Design, at Solent University, Scott concentrates on lecturing, research, film making and publication. Scott has written extensively about various ceramics and Victorian art and design. He has been a consultant to the BBC programme – Flog It.

This course looks at the amazing, varied, and often very beautiful products of the Meissen factory in the 18th and 19th centuries. The man who is credited with

creating Meissen porcelain, Johann Friedrich Böttger, had started out trying to change base metals into gold but, in the end, created porcelain, sometimes known as 'white gold'!

In France similar developments were taking place at Sevres and here the artistic achievements were as equally enticing as those in Germany.

Both these manufacturers produced new heights of beauty and quality in their creations and illustrate why both still command high prices in the auction world as well as informing us of the history of the society that inspired them.



#### D57 GROWING PLANTS FOR YEAR-ROUND INTEREST Friday 2nd August FROM CUTTINGS AND SEEDLINGS

Tutor: Lindsay Engers is an Adult Education Tutor with 32 years' experience of teaching horticulture to Adults in Buckinghamshire, Berkshire and Oxfordshire. He also grows Heritage fruit and vegetables commercially, and runs a small landscaping business.

This course covers the growing of plants from both cuttings and seeds, to enhance your garden with year-round colour and interest.

We will discuss how to choose plants for specific types of garden situations, and I will also introduce a selection of edible garden plants and how to propagate them. Along with how to sow seeds of flowers and vegetables, we will also cover how to take cuttings of trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants.

There will also be a practical element to this class where you will be actually potting some cuttings and seeds up yourself.

Free cutting material and some seeds will be provided.

Student requirements: Please bring along up to 10 maximum qty 9cm pots, plant labels, secateurs, apron/gloves, a newspaper or plastic sheet to work on and some seeds that you may like to sow, and of course a box or similar, to transport your potted items home with you.

Students will be asked to contribute a small amount to the cost of the potting mix provided on the day.

# **D59 iPAD: EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW** Friday 2nd August Tutor: Susan Mills, Cert Ed, MA, experienced teacher.

This course gives you the confidence and knowledge to explore and join the digital world - without asking a teenager!

Got yourself in a pickle over a problem with your iPad, or just bought a new device, but you don't really know what it can do? I will show you how to control your iPad and iPhone.

For example, how to: Reduce battery use, clear history, remove cookies. Basics such as emailing, privacy settings, online purchase, bill payment, tailoring personal preferences.

Watch TV, listen to music, podcasts, engage with family and friends using FaceTime. Use Message and FaceTime to call and message and see friends and family for free.

There is a whole world out there just waiting for you to explore and use. I have tips, tricks and laughter to share with you.

#### D60 AMIGURUMI CROCHET

#### Friday 2nd August

Tutor: Sarah Barclay. Crochet is good for the mind, body and soul! Being able to share my knowledge and therefore the benefits of this craft is my way of giving back and making my corner of the world a better more colourful place.

If you're bored with Granny Squares and crochet clothes, why not try Amigurumi? Amigurumi is a Japanese word consisting on two parts, ami meaning crochet or knit, and nuigurumi which is literally "small, stuffed doll". These days, amigurumi refers to more than just dolls, it can be anything from animals to food and other objects.

Learn the basics of making 3D shapes in crochet that will be the key to carry on and explore more of your crochet journey. We will cover shaping by increasing and decreasing stitches and the number sequences needed to create different shapes. You will learn how to read an amigurumi crochet pattern and we will work together to make a toy for you to take home at the end of the class.

This class is ideal for intermediate crocheters who have the ability to create a magic circle for casting on, and who want to branch out and learn new things.

Student requirements: Please feel free to bring your basic crochet kit with you (hook, yarn, stitch marker, darning needle & scissors). However, yarn, hook, stitch marker kits will be available on the day to purchase for £5
